Recent meeting:

On Friday, January 8, 2010, the Lions Low Vision Center was invited to participate in the semi-annual, scientific meeting of the Connecticut Society of Eye Physicians. One hundred and fifty ophthalmologists, their office staff, and forty vendors, specializing in equipment, office support systems, and pharmaceuticals attended the meeting.

The meeting provided educational programs for doctors, office managers, and technicians. The meeting also provided an informal opportunity for medical caregivers to meet vendors providing services, without interfering with the care of patients.

The meeting also provided the Lions Low Vision an opportunity to meet doctors

and their office staff. We also have an opportunity to attend their educational programs. It is an essential opportunity to network with the medical community. Most of our recent client referrals are now coming from the ophthalmologists attending these meetings.

Nora and Ted, who live in Granby, have been married for 46 years. They raised three children and have been blessed with two grandsons and three granddaughters. With career and family obligations, their children cannot always be there to assist their parents.

Nora also started picking out Ted clothes again. After eighteen months of treatment, Nora's vision is maintained at 20/50, gaining nearly three lines of vision back. More importantly, both Nora and Ted regained their hope, confidence, courage, and independence, through the training they received from

the Lions Low Vision Center.

Routine visits to a skilled ophthalmologist are essential for eye care. The partnership developed between the doctor and Lions Low Vision Center is an important link.
